NOTES from Pastor Randy...

Kurt Vaters is a small church pastor who writes a blog for Christianity Today. Kurt posted a blog this summer entitled, "The Essential First Step to Having a Healthy Small Church." I found the blog interesting and helpful. Here is part of that blog:

If we're going to have any hope of leading a small, struggling church into becoming a small, healthy church, there is an essential first step we cannot avoid. Don't worry, you can do it.

Step #1: Stop Assuming that Smallness is a Problem to Be Fixed

Yep, that's it.

Obvious, right?

Simple? For sure.

Easy? Not so much.

This requires a change of mindset which may be harder than many of us realize. Especially since a lot of us may not consciously be aware we've been holding on to this assumption all along.

The biggest problem with small churches is not that they're small. It's that we think being small is a problem.

As I outlined in <u>The Grasshopper Myth</u>, the toxic 'small is bad' thought process took root in me as a result of 30 years of being told we needed to fix small churches by getting them to grow.

A lot of great things have come from the church growth movement. I'll write about those soon. But since you don't fix something that isn't broken, one of the unintended consequences of the church growth movement is that it leaves a lot of people feeling that small equals broken.

But small is not the same as broken because small is not a problem. The idea that small churches are a problem – is a big problem!

When we start with the assumption that smallness is a problem, it:

- Causes resources to be mis-assigned
- Stifles creativity
- Undermines leaders who function best in smaller settings
- Overvalues management gifts, while undervaluing shepherding gifts

The biggest project is the development of plans to make Grace more "user friendly." The possibility of the addition of classrooms and expansion of the Fellowship Hall at the back of the sanctuary has become our focus at this time. In March, John Rosecrans, our architect, will meet with engineers at Grace to see if our concept of this project is feasible. Later he will meet with the Building Accessibility & Functionality committee (Shannon, Barbara, Pastor Randy, Paul, and Ken) who were assigned this project. Hopefully, a greater understanding of the structural implications will be revealed and a better idea of costs.

The other high priority for the Board is the charge given to us of discerning how Church Life, Outreach & Administration will use the funds from the Jean Atkinson gift. These three Ministries are developing and researching plans on how this fund will be used.

Please join the Board in prayer for God's guidance for both of these important issues.

He asks us to answer these questions: What is so good about Jesus Christ that I remain publicly committed to him? and, What is the good thing Jesus Christ provides that I would not be able to live without if I renounced my faith? Similarly, as we have discussed in the Men's class on Sundays, the answers to these questions help us individually to create a beginning point when we are asked to explain or share "the hope that you have" (1 Peter 3:15). - Under-utilizes the resources of 80-90 percent of the churches on earth
- Causes us to seek false success
- Blinds us to real success
- and more

On the other hand, what would happen if we all took this first step together and stopped thinking of smallness as a problem?

Advantages of a Positive Mindset about Small Churches

With the false 'smallness is a problem to be fixed' premise put to the graveyard where it belongs, church leaders of all styles, denominations and non-denominations could move on to solving other real problems together. And we could step forward into all kinds of God-honoring, life-affirming, people-loving ministry.

We could:

- Find, create and share new tools to help small churches be healthy
- Look for ways churches of all sizes can minister to people of all types
- Strategize about how to plant smaller under-the-radar churches into previously unchurched pockets
- Become more open to forms of church that can only work in a small setting
- Spend less money, time, and energy trying to grow churches that aren't meant to be big
- Utilize the strengths of leaders who work best in smaller, more intimate settings

Nancy Uhlinger and I would like to thank Barbara Furman for pinch-hitting for Nancy while she was absent in January. Barb made bank deposits, accounted for weekly contributions and other income, and processed and distributed the 2016 giving statements. While all of us sometimes help out and "back each other up", we are especially thankful for Barbara's help because the Financial Secretary job requires special knowledge and confidential access. OK, she's blushing now; I've said enough.

Expanding a little on how we "have each other's backs", I want to again point out Grace's finances have remained healthy because of the faithful giving of the members of our congregation. We are also blessed to have two other congregations who share our space and costs, and I thought you would be interested to know how much that income is. For the past year Iglesia Vision Nueva (IVN) has been paying \$575 monthly rent, and since they began renting in May 2016, Light of the World Ministries (LOTWM) has been paying \$250 monthly rent. Beginning March 1 those monthly rents will increase to \$600 for IVN and \$275 monthly for LOTWM. If either church holds a special event or activity beyond their contract, they reimburse us for the extra electricity and water expense.
